
Why I vote BLUE, no matter who

The BCDP Communications Committee posed the following questions to Kristin Miles regarding the July 14 elections. We appreciate her prompt response, which we are sharing with you below.

Q: What is your position regarding applications to vote by mail, and to what extent do you plan to investigate claims of disability?

A: If a voter submits an application for a ballot by mail claiming disability as the reason, our office will process the application and mail the voter a ballot. The law does not require that the voter indicate their disability or provide proof. Any investigation of claims of disability would not come from our office.

Q: What personal protective equipment (PPE) will be provided to election workers?

A: Election workers will be provided masks, a face shield and gloves. A new mask should be worn each day. If wearing gloves to assist voters, the gloves should be sanitized after each voter.

Q: How will voting locations be designed to reduce the risk of contracting COVID-19 by people who vote in person?

A: Protection shields will be placed between the voter and election worker at both the check-in computer and the ballot distribution location. Hand sanitizer will be available to both the voters and the election workers. Election workers will clean and disinfect commonly touched surfaces between voters. Proper social distancing will be maintained between voting booths, and voters will be encouraged to practice social distancing while waiting in line. Masks will be available for voters who are unable to provide their own. Voters will be issued a clean pen at the voter check-in area. After voting, they will place the pen in a bin designated for un-sanitized pens. Election workers shall clean and disinfect the pens prior to issuing them to the next voter.

Q: What are the chances that the Bastrop Elections Office will offer curbside voting for the July 14 election?

A: As in past elections, curbside voting will continue to be an option at all early voting and election day locations. If a voter wishes to vote curbside they can call our office at 512-581-7160 and we can notify the election workers.

Newspaper hits Cook on arrest policy

As many county sheriffs across Texas introduce policies to reduce arrests for minor traffic violations Bastrop County Sheriff, Maurice Cook, has done the opposite. A recent *Austin American-Statesman* article and a followup editorial raised questions about a policy introduced by Sheriff Cook on Feb. 1, 2019, that directed Bastrop County deputies to arrest drivers caught without a license, with a suspended license, and those who do not have auto insurance. All of these violations are minor Class C misdemeanors that carry fines only for first offenders.

Sheriff Cook stated that his intent in implementing this policy was to improve safety on our roads. However, the number of fatal traffic accidents on Bastrop County roads has increased, and Bastrop County now leads the state in the number of traffic deaths per capita in Texas counties with over 50,000 residents.

A closer look at the numbers reveals a very different outcome than Cook's stated objective and points to what has ultimately made our roads and neighborhoods far less safe. In 2016 Bastrop County sheriff deputies made 65 arrests for driver's license and insurance violations. In 2019 that number soared to 430 arrests. Over that same period of time the percentage of those arrested for these violations with Hispanic surnames increased from 38.5% to 71.2%. The number of ICE detainments in our county rose from 66 to 343.

While Cook's policy has failed to improve the safety on our roads, it has succeeded in stoking fear in the Hispanic community in Bastrop County. Many Hispanic residents now hesitate to report crimes knowing that they, their family members, or their neighbors are more likely to be detained than the criminals they are seeking to report.

Bad policy leads to bad consequences. Bastrop County needs a new sheriff who will serve each and every resident in our county and who will build the trust necessary to succeed in making our roads and neighborhoods safer. In November let's put Democratic candidate Mike Renck to work to end racial profiling in Bastrop County.

Ask the candidates

On July 14 Texas will hold a runoff election. One of the runoff races is to decide which Democrat will run in November to unseat Michael McCaul as U.S. Representative, District 10. The district takes in the northern half (roughly) of Bastrop County. We asked candidates Pritesh Gandhi and Mike Siegel to answer some questions on matters of interest to Bastrop County residents.

Q&A with Dr. Pritesh Gandhi Candidate for U.S Representative, District 10

Q: The coronavirus pandemic has put the spotlight on significant problems that affect thousands of people in Bastrop County. One of those is rural internet. We are finding that many school children and small business owners in our county have little or no access to adequate, reasonably priced internet while being encouraged to stay at home during the pandemic. What's more, they have no access to telemedicine. As congressman, what would you do to address this ongoing problem?

A: Rural broadband access is critical for education and, increasingly, telemedicine. I support H.R.1328, a bipartisan bill to expand broadband access. If passed, it would establish an Office of Internet Connectivity and Growth at the National Telecommunications and Information Administration, which would be directed to streamline access to federal resources and simplify the process for small businesses to apply for federal broadband assistance.



Further, I support treating broadband like a utility, so the government can play a bigger role ensuring access and protecting consumers from price gouging.

Q: Never has adequate, available, reasonably priced healthcare been so important to so many people in the U.S., especially in rural counties. As congressman, what would you do to make sure that all residents of Bastrop

County have access to excellent healthcare no matter where they live or how much money they make?

A: As the associate chief medical officer of a local community health center, my job is to provide care to nearly 20,000 uninsured & underinsured central Texans. In Congress, I will fight to defend the Affordable Care Act from Republican attacks, and I will build on it by enacting a public option for any

American to enroll in a Medicare-like plan. Importantly, healthcare is not just health insurance. We must address housing, education, poverty, race, and so much more to improve health outcomes.



Q: Households, businesses, and farmers throughout Bastrop County depend on a clean, reliable supply of groundwater. Population growth will continue to put increasing demands on that supply, as will large public and private water marketers who plan to pump large amounts of groundwater for sale inside and outside of the county. As congressman, what would you do to ensure that outsiders don't overpump our groundwater, leaving residents and farms high and dry?

A: We are seeing this in Bastrop County with the LCRA application to drill water wells to access groundwater from the Simsboro aquifer. Environmental groups rightly protested and asked that monitoring wells be installed to check water levels. In Congress I will fight for strict oversight on these kinds of deals to ensure that water supply is protected for local households. Also, I will fight back against the Trump Administration's efforts to undermine the Clean Water Rule and work to pass legislation like H.R.1417, the Water Affordability, Transparency, Equity, and Reliability Act.

Q: What makes you the most qualified candidate in U.S. House District 10 to address issues of importance to the residents of Bastrop County, including rural internet, groundwater protection, and healthcare?

A: I am proud to have won Bastrop County in the primary. We did so because this campaign is not driven by conceptual ideas; rather, we are focused on pragmatic, science-driven, common-sense solutions that go beyond partisan politics. For years I've worked at the intersection of housing & food insecurity, immigration, poverty, access to utilities, and healthcare. This experience, coupled with being a physician and public health expert at a community health center, uniquely qualifies me for leadership in this time. We need to defeat McCaul and we've built the campaign to do so.

Q&A with Mike Siegel Candidate for U.S Representative, District 10

Q: The coronavirus pandemic has put the spotlight on significant problems that affect thousands of people in Bastrop County. One of those is rural internet. We are finding that many school children and small business owners in our county have little or no access to adequate, reasonably priced internet while being encouraged to stay at home during the pandemic. What's more, they have no access to telemedicine. As congressman, what would you do to address this ongoing problem?



A: I will fight for universal, high-speed Internet. We need an Internet for All program that will create good jobs building essential Internet connections for every American — a 21st Century version of the Rural Electrification Act. We also need to create more opportunities for a publicly owned and controlled Internet. Through federal financing, we can help cities and counties create municipal Internet companies that will serve customers who are left out of the current market. Q: Never has adequate, available, reasonably priced healthcare been so important to so many people in the U.S., especially in rural counties. As congressman, what would you do

to make sure that all residents of Bastrop County have access to excellent healthcare no matter where they live or how much money they make?

A: I will replace a GOP "representative" who attacked every healthcare program from Obamacare to Medicare. I will fight for healthcare for all. The best path is Medicare for All, which will make healthcare universal, comprehensive, and free at the point of service, with no co-pays, deductibles or premiums. Rural hospitals will have a new funding lifeline; patients will have the choice of doctor, hospital and specialist. Population growth will continue to put increasing demands on that supply, as will large public and private water marketers who plan to pump large amounts of groundwater for sale inside and outside of the county. As congressman, what would you do to ensure that outsiders don't overpump our groundwater, leaving residents and farms high and dry?

A: I will be an advocate for homeowners, farmers, conservationists and environmentalists. Although the State has primary jurisdiction over groundwater issues, we can push the federal government to create

incentives for local water conservation and to stop profiteers from ruining homes, farms and businesses. My pledge will be to be available and accessible to the people of Bastrop, and to fight for you at every level of government. My

Q: What makes you the most qualified candidate in U.S. House District 10 to address issues of importance to the residents of Bastrop County, including rural internet, groundwater protection, and healthcare?

My 2018 campaign built on my experience as a public school teacher and civil rights lawyer. We mobilized over 1,000 volunteers, made over 300,000 voter contacts, and transformed a "safe Republican" seat into a national battleground. We are even stronger in 2020 and finished first in the March 3 primary. With your support, we will not only flip the Texas 10th in November, we will turn Bastrop blue!


Our COVID response leaves many questions

Here are some observations I have made during this COVID-19 pandemic. For one thing, I've noticed that many people trust the advice of politicians over doctors on how best to protect their families from the virus—especially advice from the president and the governor of Texas. All of a sudden because the president or governor says so, it is magically OK to go out and about in public, no masks, no social distancing. Meanwhile, medical experts are predicting a second wave of virus cases coming soon. I hope it won't put hospitals in dire straits again, especially in areas of Texas that really haven't had a peak in cases or deaths yet. Some hospitals in Alabama already ran out of ICU beds recently.

Secondly, the federal government is spending a lot of money trying to keep the cash flowing while so many people are unemployed. This is a necessity. But while the government is spending billions, not one politician is saying how they plan to pay down the debt. I hear no one talking of increasing revenue or taxing the top 5 percent who own 90 percent of the wealth. During World War II the tax rate on the richest people went as high as 94 percent after their first \$200,000. When adjusted for inflation, that would be more than \$2.5 million today.

Lastly, with so many people unemployed now, why aren't we putting people to work on rebuilding infrastructure? This would create jobs that would employ millions, cannot be shipped overseas, and typically pay very good wages. The two private dams that failed recently in Michigan are a sad reminder of the problem with aging dams in many parts of the country, including Texas. Is it going to take a bridge collapse, like the one that happened on I-35 in Minnesota in 2007 to get the politicians moving on it? President Trump says he is a wartime president. He needs to start acting like it.
