BASTROP COUNTY HERO

There are lots of kudos to hand out for heroes during and following the devastation caused by Hurri-



cane Harvey. Definitely one of those heroes was Scott Saunders, Jr., Mayor of Smithville, whose updates via social media were greatly appreciated by citizens as Smithville received 23.58 inches of rain from Friday through Monday. It was the hardest hit town in Bastrop County. Although Scott had not heard

from the Red Cross as of Tuesday morning, he did state that State Senator Kirk Watson and U.S. Representative Michael McCaul had reached out to him. Upon learning that President Trump would be visiting Austin last Tuesday, Mayor Saunders tweeted @realDonaldTrump, "Come to Smithville. It's only 30 minutes south of Austin. We need assistance. You said you would provide." However, we doubt he was holding his breath for a response.

Additionally, Mayor Saunders posted to the public, "If you would like to volunteer or make a tax deductible monetary donation (all stays local) please contact the Smithville Area Chamber of Commerce. They have done a fantastic job getting the volunteers and donations

where they are needed most. Smithville is resilient and will bounce back, but the next couple weeks will be hard, and pass slowly. Please help your neighbors and pitch in where you can."

A typical citizen's response to Mayor Saunders' numerous updates stated, "You've done a great job standing by our community, keeping them updated and safe, along with checking on everybody! We're very lucky to have you as a representative of Smithville!!" We agree.

While other examples of heroism throughout Bastrop County abound, we are particularly proud of the resilience of Smithville residents who, led by their mayor, have done a remarkable job in the face of adversity.

A link to a SurveyMonkey questionnaire was included in the email that accompanied our August newsletter. The question asked readers to select their top three issues of greatest concern to help the Bastrop County Democratic Party focus our efforts on your behalf. Survey results were as follows:

Beto O'Rourke Impresses at La Grange Meet and Greet









At least 20 Bastrop County Democrats joined a standing room only crowd of more than 150 people at a meet and greet for Beto O'Rourke in La Grange August 23. Beto, currently a third term U.S. Representative from El Paso, is running against Ted Cruz for U.S. Senator in 2018. The event was organized by Citizens for Common Sense and supported by Texas Rural Voices, the Fayette County Democratic Party and the Bastrop County Democratic Party.

Beto energized the enthusiastic crowd by sharing issues he is excited about, including opposing Trump's wall and rewriting our immigration laws. While traveling the state's rural counties, he has knocked on doors from the Panhandle to the Rio Grande Valley listening to voter concerns. Immigration reform is at the forefront for residents of Booker, Texas, where the salutatorian of Booker High School was recently deported. Henrietta, Texas, voters are anxious about the possible repeal of the Affordable Care Act. In La Grange, he heard concerns about the effect the green energy movement will have on area jobs in the coal processing industry.

When asked about gun control, Beto stated his belief in the Second Amendment but mentioned that he also supports universal background checks, pointing out dramatic decreases in gun violence where they are being implemented. Regarding Social Security, Beto pointed out that it is currently fully funded only through 2030. However, he supports a bipartisan approach such as the Social Security 2100 Act that stands to comprehensively strengthen benefits for current and future Social Security beneficiaries while keeping the program strong through the 21st Century.

Acknowledging the polls showing that Congress is currently less popular than President Trump, Congressman O'Rourke stated, "D.C. is focusing on the next election rather than the next century," particularly regarding climate change.

In his senate campaign, Beto has not received or requested funds from the Democratic National Committee (DNC,) and he mentioned that he is accepting no PAC money. Here is how you can help support Beto's run against Ted Cruz:
