Bastrop County Democratic Party 2018 County Convention

The Bastrop County Democratic Party held its 2018 convention Saturday, March 24, at Cedar Creek High School. County Chair Cheryl Reese welcomed a total of 94 attendees, including 81 certified delegates and 13 visitors.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Bastrop County Young Democrats President Natalia DePaz. Young Democrat and new Precinct 1003 Chair Xabier Hernandez followed with an inspirational speech. Next, Anthony Hubbard Jr. sang a soulful rendition of the Sam Cooke classic "A Change Is Gonna Come."

Featured speakers included former state Senator Gonzalo Barrientos, who shared a brief history of the Bastrop County Democratic Party, recognizing founding members and longtime supporters. State Senator Kirk Watson followed as guest speaker with observations about how reality versus reality TV has produced chaos in government. Senator Watson also referred to the internal fighting within the Republican Party in their efforts to elect people who would vote against public education and pass



mean-spirited bathroom bills. He stated that the Republican Party cannot be both the victim and the perpetrator regarding their plan to increase local property taxes by 14 percent while blaming local government for raising them.

However, Senator Watson expressed his excitement about the enthusiasm he sees among Democrats who are committed to do something about all the craziness foisted upon us by Republican officeholders, stating, "We're going to do something about it; we're going to vote!"

The business of the county convention included passing 62 resolutions and selecting 29 delegates to represent Bastrop County at the Texas Democratic Party's state convention June 21-23 in Fort Worth.

In addition to Senator Kirk Watson, who is running for re-election, candidates for office in attendance included Michelle Ryan, who is opposing Republican John Cyrier for state representative, District 17, and Dock Jackson, who is seeking the office of justice of the peace, Precinct 1.

Bastrop County For Beto: Grassroots Campaign Update

The seeds for our grassroots campaign, Bastrop County for Beto, were planted way back at a town hall meeting in La Grange last August. Our Fayette County neighbors welcomed Beto O'Rourke, running for U.S. Senate, and encouraged us to attend that meeting. Local enthusiasm kicked into high gear when Beto came to Bastrop County for a town hall meeting last October.

The Bastrop County for Beto Facebook page was built in the evening on Jan. 1, 2018, and by the morning of Jan. 2, we had over 200 members! We recently held our first organizing meeting, set up a Bastrop for Beto website, and have big plans to spread the good word throughout Bastrop County prior to the November election.

We have developed a preliminary plan for community outreach and have some fun, creative events in the works:

- 1. Beto Rocks!: Talented Beto supporters are painting rocks with pretty designs and the message "Beto Rocks!" Team members place these rocks in public areas around the county. We hope to spread cheer and build a "buzz," leading to more name recognition for Beto.
- 2. Smithville Jamboree Parade: On Saturday, April 7, Smithville will hold its annual parade. Michele Rutherford is putting together plans for a decorated Beto truck/trailer entry in the parade. Supporters will ride on the trailer on hay bales with signs.
- 3. Pop-Up Events: Our Beto team will be popping up at various locations in Bastrop County to greet voters and to sell Beto campaign gear. Voter registrars will be on site at these events.
- 4. Beers and BBQs For Beto: We hope to organize monthly events to rally supporters and raise funds for Beto's campaign.
- 5. Banner Drops: Supporters will meet at busy intersections and places around the county with our big Beto banner and signs to show our support.
- 6. Canvassing For Beto: We will be working in teams knocking on doors of tier 1 Democrats and sporadic voters to spread the word about our candidate.
